Traditionally Modern

Learning has been part of the life of Durham for a thousand years, and the Durham Cathedral Schools Foundation has been at the heart of the city's education for most of that time; refounded in 1414 as schools for "grammar and song" by Bishop Thomas Langley, Durham School was again refounded by Henry VIII at the dissolution of the abbey in 1541.

Durham School moved from its mediaeval home on Palace Green to its current location in 1844; although the city centre is only five minutes' walk away, the School has a peaceful, rural atmosphere.





Today, the School educates around 675 pupils. The Chorister School is our prep school, and is for for girls and boys aged 3–11. Durham School is our senior school, and is for for girls and boys aged 11–18. Boarding is available to pupils aged 8 and up, and 20% of our pupils board. Just over a third of our pupils are girls.

Our vibrant and successful Sixth Form prepares pupils for the next stage of their journey. Within a community shaped by moral integrity and kindness, we cultivate ambition and responsibility, giving all Dunelmians the foundations to be happy and make a positive

mark in the world.
By embracing this ethos, our pupils not only learn to pass their examinations today, but also receive an education that gives them confidence for life and respect for all.



Job Description

Line Management:

Responsible to the Head of Sixth Form

Main Responsibility:

To assist the Head of Sixth Form in the academic monitoring of the Sixth Form and with various aspects of the application processes in the UK and abroad for post-18 study or work options.

The successful applicant will be expected to teach an academic subject alongside the role.

Specific Duties:

- Running the Sixth Form Lecture Programme and coordinate existing Societies which cater for Sixth Form pupils.
- Working with the Head of Sixth Form, Heads of Department and Pastoral staff on the academic tracking and monitoring of the Sixth Form, including option choices at the start of Y12 and various aspects of the UCAS or equivalent application processes, such as appropriate subject and university choices and predicted grades

- Having an awareness of the importance of and contribution to recruitment to the Sixth Form, through helping with prospective pupil Taster Days, Open Days and the Sixth Form Information Evening.
- Organising ALIS testing for all Y12 pupils at the start of the year, running catch-up sessions for those (e.g. boarders) who miss the initial slot and ensuring all data is kept up-to-date, analysed and utilised in the generation of BMGs for Sixth Form pupils.
- Overseeing the applications process for international pupils including monitoring IELTS targets.
- Working closely with the Head of Careers and the Business Department (where relevant) to research and promote apprenticeships and degree apprenticeships to Sixth Form pupils, and assist with applications for such.
- Being ready to attend and assist with some if not all Sixth Form events including: Y12 Induction Day and Y12 Induction Evening (for parents); Year Group meetings; Sixth Form Parents' Evenings; UCAS days for Y12s at the end of the academic year; overnight trips to Oxford and Cambridge for their Open Days; A level Results' Day and Clearing.

 Having responsibility for the applications of those pupils seeking to study in the USA (via Common Application) or at overseas institutions, assisting with looking for scholarships.

Our Sixth Form

- Our Sixth Form is a community which combines academics, sports, music and drama, with several leadership opportunities available to pupils through societies, roles in Houses and the Y13 Leadership team which is made up of a Head Boy/Girl, two Deputies and between 12-18 Monitors. Usually there is an approximate 60/40 split male to female, while in just the current Y12 over twelve different nationalities are represented ranging from Armenia to Zimbabwe.
- Pupils receive 12 lessons of 55 minutes in a two-week cycle of the timetable in Y12 and 11 lessons per fortnight in Y13.
 Before lunch, Y12 pupils who do not have a subject lesson must attend supervised study periods in our Sixth Form Centre whereas Y13 pupils can spend such time in their Houses, where there is usually designated Sixth Form study space.
- Pupils take 3 A levels, with an increasing number also taking an EPQ. Around 10% of our pupils take 4 A levels. We offer 27 A level subjects plus a BTEC in Business.

Results

- Our Sixth Form has enjoyed pleasing academic success in recent years; the vast majority of our pupils go to university, between 40-60% to members of the Russell Group.
- Usually around 55-75% of our pupils achieve their firm choice of university and on average at least one pupil is accepted at Oxbridge every year.
- In 2020, 11 pupils applied to Oxbridge, of whom 9 received interviews, and 3 were successful in gaining places, all at Cambridge – reading History, Engineering and Psychological & Behavioural Sciences. In 2021, 9 pupils have applied to Oxbridge, of whom 5 have received interviews.
- Typically, up to 6-8 pupils apply for Medicine, Dentistry or Vet Med. Last year 4 pupils (including 2 PQAs) took up places at Medical Schools and one at Nottingham for Vet Med. The current Y12 includes a number of pupils considering applying for Medicine or Dentistry.

The range of options taken up by our Post-Sixth Form pupils is great: last year one of our acceptances for Medicine (at Sunderland) also has a contract at Newcastle Falcons; one pupil studies violinmaking in Switzerland while another got a place at a culinary school in Lyon, France.

This year one Y13 pupil has been offered a full scholarship for Michigan State University, USA due to her elite rowing status and two other pupils have applied to American universities, while applications are made each year to universities in Australia, Canada, Hong Kong and across Europe.

Other Activities

Leadership opportunities abound; The Monitor team play a key role In the operation of the School and our five Houses. Within each House, Sixth Formers will also take a leading role in organising music, drama and sport as well as many social events. They are encouraged to take on coordinating and mentoring roles within clubs and societies. The CCF, World Challenge and Duke of Edinburgh Awards all provide further opportunities for pupils to hone their skills.

Our Sixth Form includes several top athletes – many of whom are on elite pathways for sports as diverse as rowing, cricket, rugby, pentathlon, and showjumping. Built on our longstanding tradition of participation, many pupils represent local clubs as well their School in a variety of sports.

Music is an important part of School life with many pupils taking music lessons or participating in our choirs, orchestras and bands. In the recent past we have seen pupils be accepted at the RCM and RAM. In 2020 one pupil went to Leeds Conservatoire for Popular Music.

Drama too plays its part. School productions often play to packed houses in either our own Luce Theatre or in one of the many regional venues we use to showcase our pupils' talents. In March, pupils will perform Aladdin at the Tyne Theatre, with the principal roles held by Sixth Formers.
